

Homegrown Companies in Greater Phoenix

Greater Phoenix's business environment makes it the ideal place for businesses to start and grow. The following companies have all found success in the region.

Emerge

Emerge

Emerge is a web-based truckload management system that connects shippers and partners when executing full truckload transactions. The company has transformed freight strategy by connecting procurement, intelligence, execution and integrations in one unified solution. Since its founding in 2017, Emerge has raised \$172.5 million in funding. The company has over 230 employees and continues to grow by expanding its headquarters in Scottsdale and new office in Atlanta.

Persefoni



Named to the Global Cleantech 100 list twice over the company's first four years of operation, Persefoni offers a climate management platform that provides tools to measure, track and reduce carbon emissions. Its software helps users meet regulatory climate disclosure requirements and requests. Headquartered in Mesa, Ariz., the company also has offices in Canada, Denmark, Japan, Singapore and the U.K. To date, Persefoni has raised \$164.2 million in funding.

Lessen



Headquartered in Scottsdale, Ariz., Lessen is an online platform for managing properties and maintenance services. Through automation and real-time analytics on its proprietary technology platform, Lessen's professional field project managers provide hands-on service and leverage a network of vetted service professionals in over 40 markets across the United States. Since being founded in 2019, Lessen has raised \$735 million in funding and managed over 1 million properties.

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Paradox



Founded in 2016, Paradox is an artificial intelligence company that provides automated recruiting software to engage with candidates through mobile and social platforms and automate a variety of tasks. Paradox has offices across the globe, including in Baltimore, Chicago, Da Nang, Tel Aviv, and Scottsdale, where the company is headquartered. In 2023, the company made the Inc. 5000 list for having 720% growth over three years. To date, Paradox has raised \$253.3 million in funding.

Offerpad



Offerpad is an online home buyer and seller headquartered in Chandler, Ariz. The company buys homes directly from homeowners through an online process that results in an offer typically within 24 hours, allows the seller to pick a closing date, and offers free, local moving services. Since being founded in 2015, Offerpad has raised \$355.0 million in funding.

Postscript



Postscript, which operates out of its Scottsdale headquarters and a Phoenix office, is an SMS platform that enables brands to communicate and engage with customers through text message marketing. Since its launch in 2018 Postscript has more than 200 employees and has raised \$106.2 million in funding.

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Expansions and Relocations

No matter the industry, startups from across the country are relocating to and expanding in Greater Phoenix. Below are some of the startups that have expanded their footprint here.

Nikola Motor Company



Nikola Motor Company designs and manufacturers semi- and pickup trucks with electric and hybrid hydrogen-electric powertrains. The company moved its headquarters to Phoenix in 2019 and began operations on a manufacturing facility in late 2021. The company said it chose Greater Phoenix for the region's quality workforce, training programs and colleges, as well as weather that allows for year-round manufacturing. Since its founded in 2014, the company has raised \$3.3 billion in funding.

OnePointOne



OnePointOne is the first indoor farming company to offer aeroponic and hydroponic indoor farming technology. It delivers automated indoor plant production technologies that produce high quality plant material to improve health. In June 2021, the company announced expansion of its corporate and vertical farming production facilities to Avondale, Ariz. Since its founding in 2017, OnePointOne has raised over \$60 million in funding.

Fasetto



Fasetto is a software development company that increases connectivity in technology including Gravity, a program for sharing, streaming and data sends between devices without an internet connection, and Forum, which shares presentations to nearby devices without an internet connection. In March 2020, Fasetto announced the move of their headquarters to Greater Phoenix, citing reasons such as the rising tech sector, top universities, and access to leading companies to develop strategic partnerships.

Expansions and Relocations

No matter the industry, both startups from across the country and homegrown ventures in Greater Phoenix are choosing to expand in the region. Below are some of the startups that have expanded their footprint here.







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Homegrown

Arizona has three four-year public universities: Arizona State University in Tempe, Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff and the University of Arizona in Tucson. Arizona State University is home to the Ira A. Fulton School of Engineering, whose undergraduate program ranks in the top 20 percent of ranked programs by U.S. News & World Report. Many of its 350 faculty members have been honored with the highest awards in their fields. The engineering school provides over 30,000 students per year with advanced knowledge on challenges in energy, health, sustainability, education and security. The university's J. Orin Edson Entrepreneurship + Innovation Institute offers degrees, mentorship programs, collaborative spaces, and funding to help launch new startup ventures. It is also home to the Innovation Hub, a 15,000 square foot space with breakout rooms for reservation, 3D printers, and tools for prototyping. Mayo Clinic and ASU's MedTech Accelerator is a year-long immersion and two-week in-person program for medical device and health care IT startups allowing them to use the two companies' resources to develop and optimize products and services, license intellectual property, and sponsor research and clinical studies.

Arizona State University, Northern Arizona University and University of Arizona each have a full range of business, healthcare, engineering, and computer-related programs. The table below shows total enrollment for the 2022 to 2023 school year and completions for the 2021 to 2022 school year.

Arizona Innovation Challenge

The Arizona Innovation Challenge is a business plan competition designed to advance innovation and technology commercialization in Arizona. Each year, the competition awards the winners \$1.5 million in total, one of the largest amounts available for any challenge of its kind in the country. Winners also receive enrollment in the Arizona Commerce Authority's mentor-led accelerator, media support and promotion, and exposure to investors, business executives and startup CEOs.





The Arizona Technology Council is the largest trade association for technology companies in the state. With more than 750 members, the organization hosts events, provides networking opportunities, and advocates on behalf of technology companies. It also hosts a job board and promotes Arizona firms through media.



Freeway

Since 1992, Venture Madness by Invest Southwest has helped emerging growth companies raise more than \$1 billion in capital by connecting investors with ventures. It does its work through memberships, partnerships, programs and event initiatives that provide valuable insights and education on topics important to fostering the investor and emerging growth ecosystems.



Phoenix Startup Week

Phoenix Startup Week is a six-day event featuring sessions, mentoring, competitions, debates, panels, happy hours, and networking. Growing every year, Phoenix Startup Week gathers Greater Phoenix's startup community into one place.

StartupAZ



StartupAZ focuses on helping innovative startup companies improve their leadership, performance and connections while inspiring generosity and philanthropy within their communities. The organization's goal is to provide support and resources to founders in the critical stages of company building. Since being formed in 2015, StartupAZ has supported more than 120 early-stage founders and has raised over \$300 million in capital.



Venture Café Phoenix

Venture Café Phoenix connects innovators and entrepreneurs with accessible, high-impact weekly programming and events. It welcomes innovators of every expertise, experience level and identity and collaborates with a wide range of moderators, educators and thinkers to lead programs.

FinTech Sandbox

Following the example set by the United Kingdom, on March 22, 2018, Arizona became the first state in the U.S. to create a Regulatory Sandbox Program (RSP). This RSP allows financial services companies to test innovative products and technology in market for up to 24 months without obtaining a license or other authorizations that might otherwise be required.

This program encourages the development of emerging industries like FinTech, blockchain and cryptocurrencies throughout the state.

Three things to know about the Sandbox Program

1. Loans and transactions

Sandbox participants may make consumer lender loans (up to \$15,000 per individual loan and \$50,000 per consumer) or provide products or services as a money transmitter (up to \$2,500 per transaction and \$25,000 per consumer).

2. Arizona user base capped at 10,000

User base for FinTech product is capped at 10,000 customers. However, the attorney general may allow companies in the sandbox to transact with up to 17,500 customers if the company is financially solvent and has proper risk management protocols in place.

3. Limitless participants

There is no limit on the number of participants in the sandbox at any one time. The program ends on July 1, 2028.

Additionally, it should be noted that this document is only a guide for potential incentives. Actual incentives will depend on actual project parameters and varying program qualifications and requirements as determined by the Arizona Commerce Authority.

Quality Jobs Tax Credit

The Quality Jobs Tax Credit program awards \$9,000 of tax credits over three years for qualifying companies. The chart below highlights minimum qualifying capital expenditure and wage rate in an urban area, while the texts describe additional program parameters.

- \$9,000 corporate income tax credit per job (\$3,000/employee/year)
- Capped at 10,000 jobs per year
- Employer must offer to pay at least 65% of employee health insurance premium

R&D Tax Credit

A nonrefundable tax credit equal to 24% of the first \$2.5M in qualifying expenses and 15% above that amount for years 2011-2030. After that the credit is equal to 20% of the first \$2.5M and 11% above that.

- Qualifying small companies (fewer than 150 employees) can apply to make their credit refundable (75% of nonrefundable value, up to \$100,000 per year)
- An additional credit of 10% of the amount of basic research payments paid to one or more state universities for the non-refundable program






Commute Times & Light Rail


